Lindera benzoin Spicebush

Height: 6 to 12 feet **Spread**: 6 to 12 feet

Sun: Full sun to medium shade. Tolerates full shade, but

will grow more open and wide.

Soil Moisture: Moist to mesic

Soil Types: loam or sand but will tolerate clay, especially

with decaying organic matter.

Bloom Time: March-April

Bloom Description: Fragrant yellow flowers bloom along the branches before leaves emerge. Often called "forsythia of the wilds." Male flowers larger and showier than female

flowers.

Leaf: Leaves are aromatic when crushed and a tea can be made from them. The leaves turn yellow in the fall.

Fruit: Showy fruit when both a male and female plant are present.

Uses: Excellent understory plant for damp shade situations, such as woodlands, rain garden, streams and ponds, shrub borders or naturalized plantings.

Wildlife: The fruits are a good source of energy for migratory birds.

Comments: All parts of the plant are aromatic. The dried fruit may be used for potpourri or powdered to use as a spice. The leaves and twigs may be brewed as a tea.
